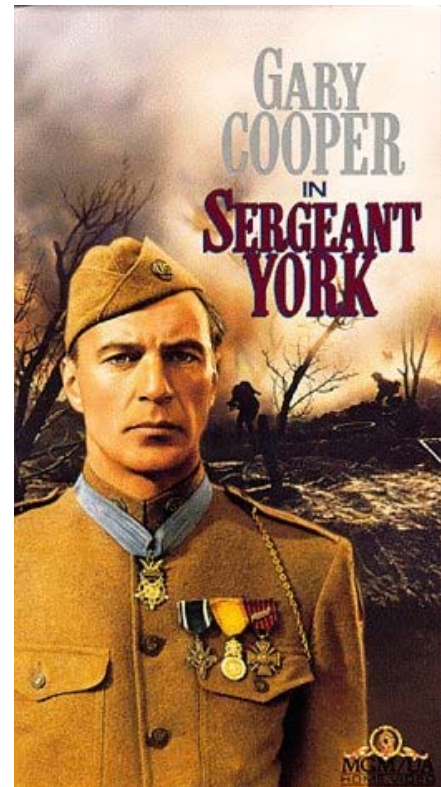
**Key Understanding:** *The Pale Horse arises in conjunction with the White Horse, the Red Horse, and the Black Horse.* This segment of Unsealings is for the purpose of understanding that the Pale Horse and its rider arise in conjunction with the rise of the White Horse, the Red Horse, and the Black Horse. ### **#806 The Black Horse Rider – Sergeant York, the hero of World War I**

**Sergeant York, the man.** The namesake of Ronald Reagan’s black horse, Sergeant York, was America’s greatest soldier hero of World War I, Sergeant Alvin York. On October 8, 1918, York was a member of a patrol sent to silence German machine-gun nests. In this single battle, he killed about 25 soldiers and forced a German major to order the surrender of about 130 others, completely overtaking a German-controlled hill. York received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his deed. French military leader Marshall Ferdinand Foch called it “the greatest thing accomplished by any private soldier of all the armies of Europe.” York was a corporal at



the time of his incredible feat. His promotion to sergeant was part of the honor for his valor and resulted in him becoming known to the United States and to much of the world as “Sergeant York.”

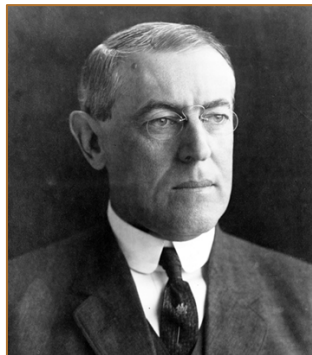
The most fascinating part of the Sergeant York story is that before the U.S. entry into World War I, York had become a deeply religious Christian. He sought exemption from the draft as a conscientious objector, but was denied. He decided to fight for his country and went on to his heroics. York’s life story was told in the 1941 movie *Sergeant York* with Gary Cooper playing the title role.

**Key Understanding: Reagan and Sergeant York.** Ronald Reagan's riderless black horse, Sergeant York, took its name from America's greatest soldier hero of World War I, Sergeant York.

The Lord designed that Ronald Reagan's black horse be named after America's greatest soldier hero of World War I to further connect (a) Woodrow Wilson, World War I, and the White Horse Rider with (b) Ronald Wilson Reagan, the Cold War, and the Black Horse Rider. Remember, the White Horse Rider is essentially also a Black Horse Rider.

[December 10, 1991, was Black Horse Day, meaning that the Black Horse Rider U.S. defeated the Red Horse Rider USSR on that day, during the administration of George H. W. Bush. "Many were made white."]

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
